

GIAT 2009 Heads for High Ground

The Grand Indiana Auto Tour chapter held its annual tour from August 5 – 8, 2009. 100 members with 48 cars drove through Vigo, Clay and Sullivan counties in the Terre Haute area.

Terre Haute is known as the crossroads of America. The National Road that passed through town was later named U.S. Highway 40 in 1926. With the east/west I70 the name seemed to fit even better.

We started at the Providence Center at Saint Mary of the Woods College. It included a tour of the beautiful grounds and buildings that were built as far back as 1840 by the Sisters of Providence order of the Catholic Church.

Our evenings were filled with music provided by members Bill Johnson and Harold Stout. They can really pick out some music! The next evening we had another group joining Bill for an even more memorable time.

GIAT participants viewed the personal collections of J.R. Turner and Don Smith. Mr. Turner has a collection of gas pumps and has recreated an antique gas station where many had a picture of their car taken. Mr. Smith's impressive collection filled five large buildings with Terre Haute and Indianapolis Speedway memorabilia. He also has a number of pace cars and sprint cars that ran on the famous Terre Haute Action Track.

We also visited the Police and Fire Museum and Hippodrome Theater. The Police and Fire Museum, a restored fire station complete with fire pole, houses some of the first fire trucks used in Terre Haute – including an Oldsmobile dating back to 1901. The Hippodrome was a vaudeville theater that once featured artists such as Al Jolsen, Valeska Suratt, Blossom Seeley and Ralph Bellamy. Terre Haute was known as one of the toughest audiences, so many performers would try out their acts there in order to be ready for other theaters.

We went to the Clabber Girl Museum where Clabber Girl Baking Powder is made. The museum outlines the history of Tony and Mary Hulman, Jr. and their impact on Terre Haute. The Hulmans started churches, donated land for a cemetery and supported local racing. They greatly helped area employment when they started the Clabber Girl Factory in downtown Terre Haute.
